I. Welcome, Introductions,

- Bill Tyler called meeting to order at Central Marin Police Community room est 1301 hr.
- A description of the handouts was summarized by Frank.

II. Review Minutes

- Bill asked that a period rather than a comma separate the following from page 7 of the draft: *“Fire Season started early this year. Novato City Council is now reviewing updates to the City Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) to better coordinate fire / law and other city services.”*
- Barbara moved and Maggie seconded: Draft Minutes of June 1, 2015 version b were approved. (Note: PDEP July meeting was cancelled).

III. DC3-PDEP Report in County Budget / Where are we now?

- Bill noted the DC3 accomplishments this past year included many that had been initiated or further developed by the PDEP committee, including:

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- Development of the Marin Business Emergency Readiness (M'BER) proposals.
- Support for the ReadyMarin.org website, with current CERT & Get Ready information.
- Continued support for the Year 2013 DC3 Strategic Proposals: Disaster Service Worker (DSW) training for government workers and a Disaster Preparedness Coordinator Position.
- Expansion of PDEP's membership to include representatives from the Access and Functional Needs (AFN) community, Marin Emergency Managers' Association, a new Council of Mayors City Council (MCCMC) member, and key utilities (PG&E and the Marin Municipal Water District) .
- Renewed efforts to provide Get Ready Marin and Get Ready 5th Grade classes in Marin County.
- PDEP continued to assess the current state of countywide neighborhood preparedness, by inviting neighborhood groups and agencies to come speak at their meetings; including neighborhood and agency groups included the Twin Cities Disaster Preparedness Committee, Dominican/ Black Canyon Neighborhood, Gerstle Park Neighborhood, West Marin Senior Services, Red Cross Ready Neighborhoods program, Marin Chapter of the American Red Cross, San Rafael Emergency Services, Marin Medical Reserve Corps (MMRC), Fairfax CERT, and Marin County CERT.
- PDEP further invited Chris Reilly, Marin County Office of Emergency Services (OES) Manager, to outline disaster management from local, Operational Area, Regional, State, and Federal levels, using Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) and the rapidly developing WEB EOC digital communications platform.
- PDEP considered reports at monthly meetings from members and key correspondents, including members representing Southern Marin, Marin County Economic Forum, Red Cross the Marin Interagency Disaster Coalition (MIDC), Marin Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) and Get Ready 5th Grade, an AFN representative, Fire Services, Council of Mayors City Councils (MCCMC), PG&E, Marin Municipal Water District (MMWD), OES sponsored training events and also considered reports from CESA / Emergency Management, Marin County Office of Education (MCOE), the West Marin Disaster Council, and other agencies
- PDEP members discussed the progress remaining to accomplish DC3's three primary goals, including:
 - **GOAL I:** Develop and provide community input to the Board of Supervisors regarding emergency preparedness programs, plans and projects.
 - PDEP will urge DC3 to conduct a current annual strategic planning session to set goals and work plan.
 - **GOAL II:** Assess, identify, and support the development of Disaster preparedness public education needs of Marin County residents, businesses, and visitors
 - The DC3 strategic goal that all government DSWs receive initial and ongoing training, and that a clear path supporting EOC level staff for professional level training, certification, exercises, and human resources evaluation continues to be a PDEP priority. PDEP will recommend this item be on the DC3 Agenda for 9-10-15 for an update report.
 - PDEP continues to support a wide range of preparedness and education efforts, as documented in the published monthly PDEP minutes.
 - PDEP will renew discussion of positive incentives for government employers, businesses and individuals to become disaster resilient, such



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- as express personnel hiring / promoting / evaluation rewards for preparedness efforts, as well as negative consequences for inaction, such as higher business license fees, or personnel practices that mandate baseline efforts in preparedness goals
- Updated and continued support for efforts including M'BER, 'Lessons Learned' from the Napa 2014 quake, and localized 'resilient community' neighborhood / city efforts will be undertaken.²
 - John Bruckbauer mentioned the Marin Emergency Managers group is reviewing a draft of the Marin County Multiyear Training & Exercise Schedule (MYTEP 2015) that would provide a calendar listing of County, City, and perhaps nonprofit training opportunities, in addition to the OES Marin Emergency Staff Development Program calendar (MESDP)³ and the ReadyMarin.org calendar.⁴ Chris Reilly, Tom Jordan, Ursula Hanks and others are helping develop the MYTEP calendar.⁵
- **GOAL III:** Further develop and utilize the public information web page at ReadyMarin.org to identify the preparedness status of organizations, agencies, businesses, and residents throughout Marin County.
 - PDEP members work closely with the webmaster at ReadyMarin.org and others to support preparedness at local levels: cities, neighborhoods, business and/or service organizations, faith community, persons with access and functional needs (AFN), and other components of the National "Community Resiliency" models. Recent and planned additions to the website include M'BER business materials, pages for seniors, financial disaster planning, CERT advanced training, and much more.
 - Both DC3 and PDEP identify Key Challenges and Outstanding Issues including:
 - Competing state and federal guidance and programs

Based on this, PDEP believes it is vital that governments train existing DSW and EOC level staff on an ongoing basis to manage this level of risk.

This is the sort of coordinated training that Frank believes could be adopted in Marin County.



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- Reduced local funding, reduced grant availability, and reduced staff time in key public agencies.⁶
- The infrequency of major disasters can make disaster preparedness take a secondary role to daily economic, political, and social pressures on government services, neighborhoods, individuals and families.
- No single government department or specialized public service agency can provide the County with a comprehensive preparedness and/or response capability that will preserve lives, homes, and the community in the event of a major or regional disaster. As such, preparedness efforts from multiple County agencies can oftentimes overlap, and would benefit in both effectiveness and efficiency from a greater degree of coordination. The PDEP / DC3 proposed Disaster Preparedness Coordinator position is one approach to solving this issue.

IV. M'Ber Marin Business Emergency Readiness is Ready Now

- Garry Lion addressed DC3 at the June 11th meeting in support of the Marin Business Emergency Readiness (M'BER) Program.
- A question was raised whether the DC3 announced agenda gave all persons notice under the Brown Act that DC3 might be asked to actively support the M'BER project, and recommend public funding in support of the effort.
- Garry is in communication with Supervisor Judy Arnold and her Aide to discern whether to apply for new Marin Community Service Funds.⁷
- The County Community Service Fund is only intended to support small (\$1,000 - \$10,000) one-time programs, preferably not more than 50% of the total project cost, with all funds managed by a nonprofit service provider or governmental entity.
- Perhaps M'BER might qualify for State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP) or Homeland Security Grant Programs (HSGP) funding.
- Questions were raised including where seed funds for the M'BER project could be raised, which governmental or nonprofit organization would receive the funds and manage them, and how these startup requirements might delay planned roll out of the M'BER project.
- PDEP encouraged Garry, with the help of the Marin Economic Forum, to explore options these questions, and if possible, have the matter placed on the DC3 Agenda of 9/10/15 as an action item.
- Maggie advised that the ReadyMarin.org website will post core M'BER business preparedness documents and concepts for public review later in August. While this will not allow for a full rollout of the M'BER effort, it may enhance startup efforts.
- Garry will present M'BER materials to the Fairfax Disaster Council in a few weeks, and the Marin County Council of Mayors and Councilmembers (MCCMC) in October.

V. DC3 June 11th Presentation by Chris Godley, former Marin OES Manager:

- Bill and Frank outlined some of the key points offered by Chris Reilly at the June 11th DC3 meeting. Chris emphasized that thinly trained Napa EOC staff made multiple errors that cost Napa County tens of millions of dollars, including:

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- Inaccurate Initial Damage Estimate (IDE) and Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs).
- Limited EOC staff asked to work excess hours, with multiple surveys, logistics, and more.
- Mismanagement of debris, in violation of State, Federal and other standards.
- Delayed opening of a Local Assistance Center (LAC) and similar recovery efforts.
- Mr. Godley emphasized the inevitable Bay Area Regional Quake will greatly exacerbate these and many other problems for Marin County. State, Federal, and Mutual Aid resources will be over extended, competition for basic lifeline services will be intense, and the range of human and infrastructure damage will far exceed that of the Napa Quake.
- Mr. Godley is scheduled to address a breakout session about the Napa Quake at the California Emergency Services Association (CESA) annual conference scheduled Sept 28-October 1st in Lake Tahoe. See: <http://www.cesastateconference.com/breakout-sessions.html>.

VI. Updates from PDEP members

- MCCMC Marin County Council Mayors + City Councilmembers

- Barbara reported the Fairfax Disaster Council has now met twice, and is reviewing the City's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP).
- Barbara thanked Cindy Swift for her efforts to schedule a series of monthly preparedness meetings to be held at the Fairfax Library this fall. Maggie Lang will help conduct some of the trainings.
- The Fairfax MMRC sponsored First Aid for Disaster Response (FADR) class scheduled August 8th was completely filled.
- A question was raised whether local fire / police or others could plan on helping housebound seniors or disabled persons with evacuations, if necessary.
- Several members pointed out that first responder agencies are not sufficiently staffed to conduct individualized evacuations in the event of a major disaster. Terry pointed out that not all elderly / disabled persons qualify to become Whistlestop clients, and thus participate in its limited transport services. Some help may come from local CERT members and other neighborhood elements.
- Dave offered to do a brief MMWD presentation at a future Council meeting.

- West Marin

- Frank reported on recent emails received from Anne Sands that:
 - Encouraged people to attend H&HS mental first aid classes
 - Requested items for their August 20th WMDC meeting
 - Notified WMDC persons of the Marin Community Fund opportunities
 - Planned on a KWMMR program with Jim Fazackerley and Lt. Doug Pittman
 - Cited a Point Reyes Light article by Lynn Axelrod on 'Pets in Emergencies'.

- Emergency Managers Group, other Public Preparedness

- John reported that San Rafael Fire appointed former Larkspur Fire Chief Bob Sinnott, as the new SRFD Deputy Fire Chief. Jim Schutz has been appointed as San Rafael's new City Manager.
- San Rafael CERT teams will be set up along lines of the Fire Department response zones. The next CERT classes will be held at Dominican University August 11+12th, and in San Rafael September 12th.
- John advised the Bay Area UASI 'Yellow Command' exercise will be held September 11th, with the County, San Rafael, and others, managing a simulated terrorist incident at the S.M.A.R.T tunnel and others.
- John met with Autodesk representatives, and will schedule Get Ready classes at that site and at Villa Marin in September.



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- San Rafael OES, the County, and others are planning on expanding TENS / ALERTMARIN type emergency alerts later this Fall using the Everbridge Mass notification system, that will allow for a wider range of alert methods, with particularized subscribers.⁸
 - SR Fire continues to make progress in replacing or seismically retrofitting stations. Station 52, with it's training tower, will be replaced.
 - SR CERTs have graduated about 250 persons – and hope to reach 300 by year's end.
 - The Marin Emergency Manager's Association met last in June, and meets quarterly. John will keep us apprised on important discussions.
- MIDC and Red Cross Events:
- PDEP thanks greatly Carol Freedman for her many years of service on the PDEP committee and as a volunteer at Red Cross and MIDC and other disaster organizations. Carol has stepped aside from these positions, but will still be active in our community.
 - Philippa Lockwood, ARC, provided PDEP with a detailed memo of ARC and MIDC activities, as she had to attend the Sonoma County VOAD meeting. Notably:
 - On July 25th, 25 Red Cross volunteers along with representatives from Novato Fire Department, the Tzu Chi Foundation, and Novato Human Needs Center were able to install 115 smoke alarms in 2 apartment communities in Novato. This effort was the latest in our on-going Home Fire Preparedness Campaign (HFPC) which is a National Red Cross effort seeking to reduce the number of home fire deaths and injuries by 25% in the next 5 years. The next HFPC event will be in Sonoma in October.
 - ARC will offer Grade 3-5th school children Disney branded pillowcases they might use to store preparedness items based on class training. More on this to follow.
 - MIDC is restructuring itself towards a less formal leadership structure, without a chair person for now. MIDC will meet quarterly, and PDEP will receive updates from Philippa or John Bruckbauer. Margaret Melsch may be asked to represent MIDC at DC3.
 - Philippa forwarded an email from Red Cross representative Cynthia Shaw from the Rocky Fire ARC response. Shelters were open at the Middleton and Kelseyville High Schools in Lake County incident to the fire, which had then consumed some 60,000 acres. Evacuations impacted over 13,000 citizens living in over 5,530 residences, including pets and livestock. PDEP members were invited to support ARC as volunteers or donors at existing sites and the planned ARC Client Assistance Center.⁹
- Southern Marin / Business Community
- Garry advised the (second year) Mill Valley Campout held July 11-12, 2015 was a great success. Families either camped at the Mill Valley Community Center, or their own backyards, with the idea that camping skills and equipment might be extremely helpful if an earthquake or fire required residents to evacuate their homes. Garry also noted that some of the entertainment elements of the experience might have obscured some of the preparedness messages intended. A refocus on the message will be tried next year.
 - Mayor Ken Wachtel and Garry were able to fly over their city in a MCSO Air Patrol fixed wing aircraft, and photograph traffic jam intersections that might be dangerous in the event of an evacuation. The traffic intersection at Strawberry was particularly troubling.

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- CERT and GReady 5th

- Maggie Lang reported the College of Marin (COM) CERT class held in June for COM staff was a great success, training 18 staff members for a total of between 40 and 50 over the past two years, with the active support of the COM Police Chief, Mitch Lemay.
- The Novato CERT class for next week is already full, and an extra Dominican University CERT class will be held in mid-August. The September San Rafael & Mill Valley CERT classes are almost full already, and West Marin & Mill Valley will host CERT training in October.
- Advanced CERT training including communication skills is planned for this Fall, with the support of Tom Jordan, County OES, Corte Madera CERTs, and others. Additional CERT organizational efforts will follow in Fairfax, San Anselmo, and Mill Valley.
- TEEN CERT classes are being considered at Tamalpais High school, and also at Tomales High school – there with the support of the local Rotary club.
- ReadyMarin.org will soon expand its postings to include Ready Neighborhoods and M'BER business preparedness materials.
- Get Ready Marin fall classes for Mill Valley & Tiburon are on the readymarin.org website and Terry Fisher, Novato Get Ready, is developing his class schedule for Fall.
- Get Ready Fifth Grade (GR5th) will be available this Fall, as there are plenty of manuals available. Southern Marin and San Rafael schools particularly may offer GR5th classes if there are sufficient instructors.

- Access + Functional Needs communities (AFN):

- Terry Scussel has stepped aside as an employee at Whistlestop, where he served as a Vice President and General Manager of Transportation, but has agreed to continue with Whistlestop in a consulting capacity for their business and service vendor functions. He continues as President of Marin Ventures, a nonprofit organization that provides a range of day services to adults with developmental disabilities.¹⁰ Terry is also the vice chair of In-Home Supportive Services, Public Authority of Marin (IHSS).¹¹
- As Terry explained in some depth at the PDEP meeting of May 4th, it is essential that paratransit drivers and similar staff receive disaster preparedness and response training. Terry seeks to update service contracts to require such training.

- Utilities + MMWD

- Dave Peery advised MMWD will host a major nighttime disaster exercise to be held at Bon Tempe Dam involving multiple law enforcement, fire, and DPW representatives, and with CalEPA and Certified Unified Program Agencies (CUPA) representatives, on 9/7/15.
- Two years ago, about 161 firefighters participated in a simulated Hazmat type exercise at the San Geronimo Valley treatment facility. This year's exercise will be particularly challenging.
- The MMWD Emergency Operations Room now has five display monitors, and is designed to support emergency response on MMWD properties.
- However, the warehouse where training occurs is about 63 years old, and should be replaced, hopefully with funding from a DHS Grant.
- James Wickham, PG&E Safety + Preparedness Specialist, was unable to attend, and was excused. His portion of the Agenda will be heard next month.

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- Fire Services + County at Large Issues:

- Bill Tyler advised Novato Fire and Police will participate in this year's 'National Night Out' Community Relations effort, meeting with city residents at the Farmer's Market and several neighborhoods on August 4th.¹²
- Bill summarized the approximately two dozen major fires burning on 8/3/2105 while reading from the CalFire Executive Summary for the morning.
- These fires, changing by the hour, included some 295 known ignitions in California, some of which were remote and un-attended, and 26 fire complexes involving about ten thousand firefighters, thousands of evacuated persons, about 17 injured, and the death of one firefighter.
- The many fires detailed in Bill's oral report were changing as we spoke, and included 'Plume Dominated Fires' of such intensity and speed over very dry conditions that they created their own local weather conditions, and were extremely risky to contain.¹³
- The Rocky Fire in Lake, Yolo, and Colusa Counties then had consumed about 60,000 acres, with some 5,500 residents evacuated. It was being managed by a Type I Incident Management Team.
- As a point of comparison, the Year 2003 San Diego 'Cedar Fire', the largest in State history, burned 280,278 acres (1,134.2 km²) 2,820 buildings (including 2,232 homes) and killed 15 people including one firefighter.¹⁴ The most expensive fire in State history was the Oakland firestorm of 1991, or 'Tunnel Fire' that ultimately killed 25 people and injured 150 others. The 1,520 acres (620 ha) destroyed, included 2,843 single-family dwellings and 437 apartment and condominium units. The economic loss has been estimated at \$1.5 billion.¹⁵
- Marin fire crews have been assigned to the Rocky, Wragg, and Lowell fires, and typically work 24 hrs 'on', 24 hrs 'off' as part of a 'rainbow strike team' of crews from multiple jurisdictions.
- Normally, Marin fire agencies are staffed and equipped for a 'high level response'. With so many fire crews deployed, Marin agencies will respond with a 'medium level response', but likely with mutual aid from nearby counties seeking to quickly quench any fire before it might become too large to manage. This level of response requires many staff to cancel vacations, and backfill across many jurisdictional lines.

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- Bill reminded us: clear vegetation around your homes. Help avoid wildfires.
- OES, Training and other Events:
 - Frank outlined some training events of interest:
 - The 5/07/15 County OES annual functional exercise, 'Burning Marin 2015' that engaged County, Tiburon/Belvedere, Mill Valley and Novato EOCs in a three fire scenario will be reviewed in a 'Burning Marin Tabletop' exercise August 26th. Persons who participated in the May exercise should contact Ursula Hanks at County OES.
 - Frank is scheduled to give another new employee EDAPR class August 6th. Some 60 new County employees registered for the class.
 - Frank has spoken with representatives of from Drake Terrace adult community in San Rafael about doing a Get Ready for Seniors class later this summer, hopefully in coordination with institutional preparedness efforts for seniors and other persons with AFN limitations sponsored by County H&HS.
